### The Integrated Media Corps Internship

The Integrated Media Corps (IMC) was founded by the Of ce of University Communications in conjunct on with the Communication Department in the Fall of 2010 to give Wit enberg juniors and seniors the opportunity to develop skills working with mult media product ons and various public relations and communication projects in the form of a paid internship.


This year's IMC consisted of six students who learned how to stream live video broadcasts of both athlet c and community events onto the internet, create highlight packages for the Wit enberg Athlet cs YouTube page, and write and record Wit enberg radio announcements to be played on WUSO.

The students also had the opportunity during their weekly meetings to speak with local professionals involved in all different types of media. These included Jack Pohl and Neil "Hutch" Konerman from WDTN-TV, Dave Jablonski from the - , Marty Bannister from RadiOhio, and Georgie Woessner from WDPR, to name a few. The interns also met multiple times with Karen Reynolds, the Director of Wit path Career Services, to discuss future internships.

The IMC broadcast many of the home Wit enberg athlet c events, allowing students' family members who could not at end to view the games live online. The goal was to reach out to more parents of Wit enberg students, alumni, and prospect ve students who are interested in Wit enberg.

The IMC also f Imed mult ple community events, both on Wit enberg's campus and in the surrounding Springfeld area. These events included the Ohio Communication Association Conference, art exhibits at the Springfeld Museum of Art at Wit enberg University, and a food eating contest for athletes in Post 95.

Nine new members were selected for this internship during the 2011-2012 academic year.

Established in 2005, the Laurels in Communicat on award is intended to honor one Communication major who has distinguished him- or herself while at Wit enberg. Specifically, this awar


## Alumni Reflect on the Comm Program
